Summary of Module							
This module aims to provide an introduction to the development and different forms of programming within the UK broadcasting industry. The analysis and application of key theoretical paradigms, codes and conventions which govern specific genres will be considered within the cultural, political and historical context of broadcast output. Concepts pertaining to issues of ideology, representation, television aesthetics, public service broadcasting and the advent of digital/multi-platform delivery will also be examined within the framework of the production process, audience reception and global impact. Consideration will be given to the following:  Key historical developments within a UK context  Contemporary debates on public service broadcasting  Audiences and contemporary patterns of consumption  Globalization and impact of multi-platform delivery on processes of production
