Summary of Module			
This module provides students with the essential academic skills needed to succeed in a programme of higher education study. In particular, the module equips students with core competencies in academic writing, reading, research skills, critical thinking and presentation skills. The module also introduces students to essential academic conventions, academic language, appropriate academic tone and register, referencing skills and principles of academic integrity, including the appropriate use of generative AI tools in academic work. The module supports essential student activities, including independent and collaborative learning within the classroom, while also fostering transferable skills that are applicable to the world of work. Wherever appropriate, the learning and teaching resources and activities are contextualised to the main programme subject in order to make them as relevant and engaging as possible for students, and to ensure that the skills are transferable to the student's future career. By the end of the module, students will have gained practical academic tools and strategies to enable them to study confidently and independently throughout the remainder of their academic programme of study and provide them with the skills and academic knowledge to be able to communicate the results of their study accurately and reliably, and within structured and coherent arguments. These skills are also transferable to professional and personal life, including research, critical evaluation of complex ideas, independent work, teamwork, and effective communication, both orally and in writing.
