Summary of Module			
This module allows students the opportunity to explore, in depth, one contemporary issue in the law. The module is intended to help students develop legal research, legal writing, and critical thinking skills. The module can be delivered in any term and can be adapted to meet credit deficit to enable students to progress with their studies where otherwise they would have been prevented from doing so. The student will work with a member of staff to design an assessment to meet their particular needs and interests and will work independently, with some limited supervision, to deliver their chosen project. At SCQF Level 8 the student will be expected to deliver a piece of written work of 2500 words in length. .
