Summary of Module			
The purpose of this module is to enable students to develop their critical writing skills ahead of the Dissertation module in Honours year. In addition, students who opt not to enter Honours year will have gained experience in completing a substantial piece of independent written work thus enhancing their employability skills. Students will, following initial discussions with a member of staff, select a legal topic on which to write a 3,000 word critical essay. The choice of essay is largely to be determined by the student and staff input is solely around aiding the student to clarify the topic of their project. Students will then work independently on their essay however support will be available on general writing skills such as structure, clarity of thought and writing etc. Students will be expected to also produce a reflection on their experiences of working independently.
