Summary of Module

This module provides students with knowledge of the European Union (EU), exploring issues including the foundation and functioning of EU and the application of EU law to member states.

Through studying this module, students will gain an advanced understanding of how the EU functions as a legal order, including examining the core institutions of the EU (e.g. the Commission, the Parliament and the Court of Justice). It will also explore the EU as a model of advanced economic integration providing an understanding of the principles of the EU single market and the four freedoms.

Students will gain an understanding of the constitutional structure and competence of the EU and its institutions, as well as the sources of EU law and the legislative process. Furthermore, students will study the allocation of competencies between the EU and Member States, and the relationship between EU and national law, including domestic and EU remedies. Finally, students will study the European Charter of Fundamental Rights and contemporary issues and challenges related to the EU.
