Summary of Module

This module covers the fundamentals of the Scots law of evidence relating to criminal and civil matters. The course outline below is indicative and the final form will take into account any potential changes to the law such as those proposed under the Victims, Witnesses and Justice Reform (Scotland) Bill.

The course will be roughly split into four parts, although there will be some overlap between these:

- (1) Background and basic concepts:
- Types of evidence (real, oral, documentary);
- The operation of the adversarial criminal trial and civil proof;
- Relevance:
- Standards and burdens of proof;
- Admissibility;
- Weight;
- Sufficiency;
- Human rights law considerations
- (2) Evidence in criminal cases:
- Burden and standard of proof (including re defences);
- Sufficiency and corroboration (including the Moorov doctrine; distress as corroboration; circumstantial evidence; and identification issues);
- Admissibility (including the best evidence rule; hearsay; improperly obtained evidence and confessions; character and collateral evidence)
- Witness competence and compellability
- Criminal law-specific presumptions
- (3) Evidence in civil cases:
- Burden and standard of proof;
- Sufficiency
- Admissibility (including best evidence; hearsay; statutory documentary evidence)
