Summary of Module

The module introduces students to the international regulatory environment for financial services. Students will be able to understand models of regulation and the international features of regulation. Furthermore, students will be able to critically examine and understand that the benefits of regulations are achieved by the dynamics of laws and regulations that are composed of international best practice, the role of a compliance function adopted by a business, and managing regulator known as: y and integrative relationships.

Students will also learn the compliance function from three supportive learning objectives known as: international best practice, the role of compliance function within a firm, managing regulatory relationships.

Another important area of learning and teaching elements known as: managing the risk of financial crime. The three objectives that equip the students with the knowledge are: a) money laundering, terrorist financing, and the standards required of firms; b) practical implications, and policies, procedures and controls required of firms.

The fourth elements set consists of Ethics, Integrity and Fairness. The learning objectives of the elements are: a) Ethics, b) market integrity, c) Fair conduct, d) Client Vulnerability, and e) Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG).

The final and the fifth elements set consists of: a) Corporate governance, b) Key risk types their application and impact on compliance function.

Overall, emphasis is given on how these elements and objectives of learning are applied in practice considering the professional responsibilities and the career covered in this module.
