Summary of Module

In the Law Honours Dissertation Module, the student will carry out an independent piece of research on a topic relevant to a law degree. This will allow for the development of the student's abilities relating to independent research, critical evaluation and review; as well as enhancing the student's skills in writing an extended piece of work. The research that is undertaken and the production of a dissertation will add to the body of knowledge on the subject.

This module is developed in accordance with the UWS Graduate Attributes and helps students to develop the range of skills, qualities and abilities which will prepare them for success both outwith university and beyond their period of study at UWS. This module will help the student develop academic skills such as gaining knowledge, being a critical thinker, being analytical, being a problem solver, being digitally literate and being an autonomous learner.
