Summary of Module			
Inspired by the positive experiences of students at the Jean Pictet Competition, which uses a simulated conflict environment to teach students the laws of armed conflict, this module aims to highlight the practical relevance of the International Humanitarian Law in contemporary armed conflicts, as well as the human, emotional dimension to the practical application of the jus in bello. An ‘affect-based’ approach will be adopted in order to foster a contextualised and practical understanding of the application of IHL. Following on from 4 introductory lectures on the key rules and principles of international humanitarian law, the module will take a dynamic, interactive approach to the teaching of IHL, in order to emphasise the practical importance of this body of law, as well as highlighting the real-life challenges surrounding its implementation. Students will be assigned to small groups to directly examine selected issues taken from present-day reality, and prepare analyses of these individually and collectively. In these interactive workshops, the groups will engage in fictional scenarios and watch as the situation develops week-on-week, as on-the-ground events shape (and complicate) the legal issues to be navigated/resolved.
