Summary of Module

This module provides a comprehensive introduction to the financial services industry, with a specific focus on investments. It covers key financial principles and products in depth including assets and markets, derivatives, investment funds and taxation, investment analysis and portfolio performance. It explores the broader economic environment in which the financial services industry operates and looks at how economic activity is determined and managed in different economic and political systems. The module ensures candidates are provided with an understanding of ethical behaviour and acting with integrity.

Emphasis is given on how these topics and theories are applied in practice considering the professional responsibilities and the career development issues associated in this field.
