Summary of Module			
This course will cover the law related to Involuntary Obligations which includes within it several delicts recognised in common and statutory law in Scotland. The law of negligence covers issues related to the duty of care, the standard and degree of care, the burden of proof, causation, and remoteness of damage. Other common law delicts this module will cover include nuisance, economic loss, professional negligence, and psychiatric injury. This module will also examine the caselaw and international legal instruments related to breach of confidence, and privacy law. Further, this module will also cover a range of statutory delicts. This module will cover harm to reputation by examining the Defamation & Malicious Publication (Scotland) Act, 2021. Other statutory instruments covered by this course include the Occupiers Liability (Scotland) Act, 1960, and Animals (Scotland) Act 1987. This module will also cover the main principles underlying the award of damages, remedies in delictual actions, and limitations on claims. The course will include extensive reference to case law and the coursework will provide an opportunity for an in-depth study of particular topics. The seminars will be problem based, involving the application of the principles studied to hypothetical examples. This module is developed in accordance with the UWS Graduate Attributes and helps students to develop the range of skills, qualities and abilities which will prepare them for success both outwith university and beyond their period of study at UWS. This module will help the student develop academic skills such as gaining knowledge, being a critical thinker, being analytical, being a problem solver, being digitally literate and being an autonomous learner.
