### **Summary of Module**

Knowledge is widely regarded as being instrumental to the success of many organisations in the modern, knowledge-based economy. However, the managerialist conceptualisation of knowledge as a transferrable, controllable resource is naive and sometimes even dangerous. It can result in the misidentification of the knowledge that forms the basis of an organisation's success and competitive advantage; misunderstandings with regard to how organisations learn, evolve and innovate; misconceptions with regard to the use of consulting firms as external knowledgeproviders; sub-optimal technology development efforts; and disregard for the challenges associated with the implementation of new technologies. It may also have destructive effects on labour.

The module provides the students with an opportunity to become knowledgeable and incisive critical thinkers by developing the necessary awareness that will allow them to avoid the aforementioned pitfalls through the exploration of both orthodox and critical literature covering topics such as:

- Organisational knowledge and learning;
- Knowledge management;
- Becoming a competent practitioner;
- Politics of collaborative knowledge work;
- New technology development;
- Consequences of new technologies;
- The role of consultancies in the knowledge economy.
