Summary of Module			
At the core of LPE is a focus on how socio-economic inequalities, crises and power relations are legally and politically configured. LPE explores the central place of law within the wider political economy to reveal how market relations (and the inequalities experienced) are neither natural nor neutral. Rather, LPE understandings seek to unearth the ways in which law has been mobilised to protect the interests of some over others. In doing so, this module examines the ways law constitutes and protects contemporary markets, and how these legal structures might be reconfigured or reimagined to reduce socio-economic inequality and affect social change. Part of this module therefore explores how this reimagining has been theorised in the past through core texts of political economy and in present-day formulations by researchers at the forefront of LPE analyses. The module is delivered in two parts, with a theoretical approach to LPE in the first 6 weeks, and the last 6 weeks testing these theories by applying them to a range of real-world examples. The first six weeks is theoretically demanding, engaging with several LPE theories, texts, and thinkers. The practical approach in the second half of the module, zooms in on several specific areas of interest by approaching them through an LPE lens: crypto currency, the food we eat and how its grown, the existence of sports teams and environmental crises. The module confronts a number of these issues and explores how changes in law impacts the political economy and how developments in the political economy can impacts the shape of law. The module will be of interest to students interested in the theoretical foundation of law, critical approaches to the law, and/ or those who want to use law as a tool for social change and/or a more just society.
