Summary of Module			
Legal Advocacy Skills aims to introduce students to a variety of academic skills necessary for the presentation of oral and written legal argument. Students will be expected to learn, primarily, through group based practical workshops utilising a blend of written and audio-visual materials. Students will be expected to work independently and in groups with others in order to develop skills for the presentation of oral legal arguments. This will be achieved primarily through the analysis of case law. Students will be required for assessment purposes to compete in teams in mini moot trials or submit a presentation (as best adapted to the available methods of delivery). • Identify, source and apply relevant legal principles and rules to practical problems • Interpret statutory provisions, as well as judicial and academic opinion • Develop and deliver appropriate legal argument orally and in writing • Develop general advocacy skills • Develop critical thinking skills
