# **Summary of Module**

This module provides students with real world experience of working in a simulated newsroom environment to produce a range of multimedia content to deadline during a series of weekly newsdays. In today's everchanging journalistic environment students are trained in on-line news and features creation, podcasting, video and audio production. The module is designed to capture latest industry practice including regular conference time slots, fast track punctuated deadlines and digital editing. The module also provides students the opportunity to present an extensive folio of work completed either as a result of workplace experience or work-related projects, including lectures on reflective and critical analysis of industry practice, journalism ethics and law.
