Summary of Module			
This module aims to give students detailed knowledge and understanding of the Law of Property in Scotland. The module begins with an introduction to the classification of property followed by a consideration of the acquisition and transfer of ownership in relation to both heritable, moveable, corporeal and incorporeal property. In addition, the system of land ownership will be considered alongside a detailed examination of the system of the purchase of heritable property in Scotland, including the process of offering for heritable property, the main principles in relation to examination of a property title, a consideration of the documentation utilised in a property transaction, including methods of electronic transfer, and an overview of the system of land registration
