#### **Summary of Module**

Public Law aims to give students a detailed knowledge of key aspects of constitutional law within the United Kingdom. The module begins with an examination of different types of constitutions and the distinction between legal rules, non-legal rules, and other sources. The relationship between the legislature, the executive, and the judiciary is also examined. From here, the fundamental doctrines of the constitution are examined alongside the role of the judiciary within the constitution. Students will then move on to examine the role and powers of both the Westminster and Holyrood Parliaments. From here there is an examination of the role of the Monarch and the prerogative within the constitution. The relationship between central and local government is then explored in some detail with an introduction to local government law. The important constitutional remedy of judicial review is also introduced to students. Finally, some basic international aspects of the UK constitution are examined.
