Summary of Module			
In this module, students will work in teams of two and present a live radio programme every week for 8 weeks, on UWS radio station. Students will write a short critique of each programme, and an overall critique of the development of their personal skills over the 8 week period. For assessment, students will submit a portfolio containing the programme critiques, recordings of all the programmes, the overall critique, and an edited “best bits” submission. Students will also have two broadcasts peer reviewed. This module has a reduced level of class contact, but will make significant demands on your time out with class. Radio broadcast formats.
