Summary of Module			
The aim of this module is to provide students with a contemporary understanding of the law of contract in Scotland. The module will be delivered by means of twelve workshops over one trimester supported by additional reading and asynchronous material. During workshops students will work on a variety of learning activities such as problem solving, delivery of short presentations, and group work to explore the materials. Students taking this module will gain understanding of issues such as the nature of contracts, the contrast between contracts and other forms of voluntary obligation such as promise, aspects of formation of contract, such as capacity to contract, the operation of contracts, contractual terms, how contracts end, and remedies for breach of contract To introduce students to the law of contract in Scotland. To provide students with an understanding of key concepts of Scots contract law. To instil skills and competencies which underpin further learning of Scots private law subjects.
