means of seeking out and/or facilitating peer support, will also form part of the overall approach to teaching and learning on this module.

The project module is structured around key themes associated with:-

- * Research Question and Aims
- * Conducting a Review of Literature
- * Data Collection / Case study analysis
- * Data Analysis (If appropriate)
- * Writing Findings and Conclusions

Students will discuss with their supervisor the validity of their project ideas and present a project proposal which must be business and management in nature.
