Summary of Module

The aim of this module is to provide students with a contemporary understanding of the law of contract in Scotland. This will include an explanation and analysis of how contracts are formed and their substance, how contracts may be vitiated and on what grounds contractual validity may be challenged and an analysis of how contracts break down or otherwise are terminated and what remedies may be available to the parties.

Students taking this module will gain understanding of issues such as the nature of contracts, the contrast between contracts and other forms of voluntary obligation such as promise, aspects of formation of contract, such as capacity to contract, the operation of contracts, contractual terms, defective and illegal contracts and how contracts end. Consideration will be given to the remedies for breach of contract, title to sue, prescription and extinction of contractual obligations. There will be an analysis of the development of the law of unjustified enrichment and consideration of the obligation under the law of unjustified enrichment to make restitution or pay recompense in respect of any benefits received. Consideration will also be given to enforcement of contractual obligations and debt recovery.

The module will be delivered by means of lectures and workshops over one trimester supported by additional reading and asynchronous material. During workshops students will work on a variety of learning activities such as problem solving, delivery of short presentations, and group work to explore the materials.
