Summary of Module

Art Research Methods introduces students to a range of art research methods which include historical and contextual as well as formalist and material frameworks, so they acknowledge and consider diverse ways of reflecting on their own creative practices.

In response to weekly lectures, and seminars, students are required to develop an annotated bibliography consistently throughout the module and submit a video presentation to discuss how their reading helps identify their own research focus.

By completing this module, students can improve their knowledge on:

- Art research methods
- Relationship between theory and practice
- Academic contexts for creative practice
- Research ethics

Assessment 1 – 1,500 word annotated bibliography (50%)

Students will develop an annotated bibliography to document their academic reading related to their own creative practice, art research methods and theoretical framework.

Assessment 2 – 5-minute poster presentation (video recording) (50%)

Students will produce a poster presentation to reflect on their academic reading journey and discuss how specific theories could inform their creative practice including a potential research topic and question.
