<b>Summary of Module</b>			
<p>Company Law begins with an introduction to the development of the law in this area as it operates throughout the UK. Initially the module introduces the process of creating a limited liability entity and of the personnel involved in its management, including an examination of a company's separate legal personality.</p> <p>Thereafter there will be a detailed examination of the role, duties and responsibilities of those who promote, own and manage such entities, including the rules on disqualification of directors. Company Law is then considered in more detail in the context of the environment in which it operates, involving an examination of the relevant professional and institutional codes regulating the commercial marketplace, including a discussion of appropriate statutory and case law provisions and debate relating to topical issues in this field. There will also be an examination of the rules pertaining to minority shareholder protection and thereafter a consideration of issues in relation to corporate crime.</p> <p>Finally, the procedures pertaining to the winding up of a company will be considered, along with a detailed examination of the various processes available and of the different persons involved in this area, including their statutory powers and duties.</p>
