Summary of Module

The aim of this module is to promote social justice and change through education by working alongside citizens who are currently on a community payback work order. This module follows on from the module Payback Academy: Introduction to Criminology and Criminal Justice and applies the knowledge within that module to focus on a particular area of the Scottish Justice system to create a piece of artwork (song, poem, script, collage, zine, poster, radio advert etc) about how that area of justice can be improved to achieve better outcomes. The artwork created each year will be brought together and shared with stakeholders in attempts to improve the justice system.

The module will be delivered using a flipped classroom approach building on different aspects of criminology and criminal justice in Scotland and learners will consder ways of improving different aspects of the justice system and the theories that underpin it. It will include but is not limited to:

Pathways in and out of offending

An overview of the Scottish Justice System

How to promote social change and justice

Criminological and sociological theories such as: the social determinants of crime, deviance, stigma, socialisation and crime, crime as social harm, victimology, intersectionality and racism.
