Summary of Module

The Dissertation Module is a crucial part of the MSc programme, allowing students to apply their learning and gain expertise through a narrative dissertation on a chosen topic approved by the module co-ordinator.

It builds on existing knowledge through workshops that provide necessary techniques and principles for independent research and professional-standard dissemination.

Students receive personalized guidance from a dissertation supervisor and choose their study area after preparatory workshops.

Eligibility requires successful completion of the Year 2 Practice Placement (Social Work Practice 2 Module).

The dissertation will be based on a literature review on a topic of their interest. The dissertation based on a literature review will enable students to showcase the knowledge that they have gained over the past two years of their master's study both in class and through their placements. The aim of the narrative literature review based dissertation is to summarise and provide a critical analysis of the research that they have explored, allowing them to highlight gaps in the literature and add their own perspectives and insights to an area of your interest and passion.
