The dissertation will be based on a literature review on a topic of their interest. The dissertation based on a literature review will enable students to showcase the knowledge that they have gained over the past two years of their master's study both in class and through their placements. The aim of the narrative literature review based dissertation is to summarise and provide a critical analysis of the research that they have explored, allowing them to highlight gaps in the literature and add their own perspectives and insights to an area of your interest and passion.
