This module utilises a written assessment using a template; this is intended to help students become familiar with a report writing format. The second assessment consists of a presentation. The first assessment allows students to demonstrate their understanding of how historic developments within social work inform current policy and practice; the latter assessment focuses on the more specific application of theoretical and ethical considerations to professional decision-making.

Assessment 1 Written assessment 3,500 words. 80% of Module weighting.

Assessment 2 Presentation 20% of module weighting.
