Summary of Module

This module is aimed at those who have already taken Introduction to Arabic 1 or have an equivalent knowledge of the Arabic language. Students will be introduced to additional key basic grammar points and tenses of the Arabic language.

There will be a systematic approach to explanations of sentence patterns in communicative scenarios and development of basic vocabulary. the grammar studied will be practiced through uncomplicated grammatical exercises as well as through reading and listening comprehension exercises. It will also be applied in presentations, role plays, pair-work exercises and other interactive activities. Students will learn how to discuss basic likes and dislikes, plans and future arrangements; they will talk about the weather. They will research a region of an Arabic-speaking country and make a presentation, role-play or write an uncomplicated essay, for example recommending a tourist destination. Arabic will be the working vehicle of the class, and all four language skills will be developed. Students will be expected to practise outside class by means of simple grammar exercises, written assignments and other pieces of homework. Learning will be supported by the use of on-line learning environments.

The mode of delivery will normally be over 12 weeks, 2 hours a week.
