Summary of Module

This module is designed for students who have already got some knowledge of the initial concepts of academic skills in English. It aims to develop students' understanding of the necessary academic skills in English to be successful in a UK-based academic context by developing their academic language skills as well as learner autonomy and initiative. During the module, they will build up on the skills introduced in ASE1 to enhance their understanding of basic principles of academic research and develop their skills on how to search for, classify and evaluate documentary sources. Linguistically, students will build up their understanding of different academic reading and writing techniques, that will help them to produce a written assignment, with due attention to text structure, clarity of text, linguistic accuracy, and stylistic appropriateness. In addition, students will continue to develop their academic presentation skills, with due attention to stylistic appropriateness, clarity and linguistic accuracy. Throughout the module, selected areas of grammar, lexis, style, discourse and communication will be developed, and students will be encouraged to develop their independent research skills and learner initiative through guided use of the university library and other resources.

At the end of the module, students will be expected to demonstrate a level of language comparable to the mid band of level B2 in the CEFR.
