## **Summary of Module**

Learners will explore the foundations of contemporary social work with reference to professional values and ethics. Theories and approaches for informing practice with service users are introduced. Critical reflection, professional identity and ethical professional practice are developed throughout the module.

- Exploring the nature of contemporary social work;
- Developing knowledge of theories and approaches to engage service users;
- Applying anti-oppressive professional values.

Students will be expected to draw from their current practice and use examples within all learning activities, including summative assessment.
