Summary of Module

This module will introduce students to sociological theory and sociological tools required to explore the relationship between the service user and the cultural, political, social spaces of contemporary life.

Students will gain an understanding of the relational nature of 'public issues' and 'private troubles' within complex social contexts.

Students will develop a reflexive approach to practice that will address issues of antidiscriminatory practice whilst strengthening social work values.

As an exercise in applied sociological investigation, students will have the opportunity to explore their own socialisation and current position in society.

The module will be delivered in a hybrid mode with a combination of synchronous / live online learning opportunities including learning materials, resources and learning activities through a virtual learning environment. Students will be expected to draw from their current practice and use examples within all learning activities, including summative assessment.
