Summary of Module							

This module is aimed at those students who successfully completed Spanish 1.1; or for those with knowledge of the Spanish language at A1 of CEFR. Students will be introduced to other key basic grammar points of the Spanish language and some tenses of the indicative including: present continuous, future and simple past.

There will be a systematic approach to explanations of sentence patterns in communicative scenarios and to vocabulary development. The theoretical component of the module will be presented in the lecture session of the classes.

In the seminar session the grammar studied will be practiced through grammatical exercises and by means of syntactic and morphological analyses to make students aware of the workings of the language; as well as through reading and listening comprehension exercises. It will also be applied in presentations; role plays; pair-work exercises and other interactive activities.

Students will learn how to talk about likes and dislikes, make plans and future arrangements, buying transport tickets and organize trips, talk about the weather and about the past. Typically, students will read a short story, gather information and research on a region of Spain or a Spanish-speaking country and then do presentations, role-play or write short essays on specific topics.

The mode of delivery will be over either 12 weeks (3 hours a week) or 24 weeks (2 hours a week)

Learning and Teaching

This module is a practical language class which offers the opportunity to students to develop their formal knowledge of the Spanish language and of prescribed topics. Students engage in a variety of activities in class and in independent study to practice their language skills. The four skills are developed through class activities: listening to audio/video recordings; working in pairs or in small groups to work on speaking skills, engaging in a variety of reading exercises to develop skills in Spanish. Grammatical work is consolidated through related speaking tasks and homework exercises. The module is supported by the use of Virtual Learning environments, which are integral to the student learning experience, enhancing the use of external links for guided and independent study.
