Summary of Module

By examining contemporary theoretical perspectives on crime and inequality this module aims to familiarise students with the process of 'rethinking' issues in criminal justice when the key referent (crime) is subjected to a series of critical deconstructions. This will involve an examination of the wider social and political relationships between crime and society predominately in the UK, although examples from elsewhere will also be utilised.

Various constructs such as class, gender, race, power, status and social order will be considered through examining different forms, explanations and responses to criminality.

Topics will include social class and inequality, sex and crime, drugs and crime, hate crime, state crime, green criminology and rural criminology.
