#### **Summary of Module**

This module introduces students to the importance of assessment in social work practice. It encourages students to take a holistic approach during assessment. Students will improve their awareness of how assessment influences professional decision making and risk management planning. Themes of risk, needs, strengths and protective factors will be developed throughout the module.

The module will be delivered in a hybrid mode with a combination of synchronous / live online learning opportunities including learning materials, resources and learning activities through a virtual learning environment. Students will be expected to draw from their current practice and use examples within all learning activities, including summative assessment.
