Summary of Module

This module is designed for those students who completed Spanish 2.1. One of the pivotal elements of this module is the use of the subjunctive in subordinate clauses. The module is centred on the introduction of the following grammar items: the imperfect, present perfect and pluperfect tenses of the subjunctive, the perfect conditional. Conditional clauses, indirect speech, concessive clauses, finality clauses, the expression of impersonality, temporal constructions will also be studied.

Classes will be a mixture of lecture and seminar. In the lecture session of the class the main grammar points will be introduced. In the seminar section all four language skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing) will be put into practice through grammatical exercises, reading and listening comprehension exercises, presentations, role plays, pair-work exercises, and other interactive activities whose topical content will include: different cultures and habits, products and business conferences, political systems, expressing wishes and proposals; emotions, talking about people's characters and personalities, introduction to key legal concepts, expressing moral judgments, learning foreign languages.

Students will gather information and deliver a presentation on a cultural issue of Spain or a Spanish-speaking country. Students will also have to read some short stories or novella in Spanish and write a brief analysis and a summary in Spanish.

This module will be delivered over 12 weeks (3 hours a week) or over 24 weeks (2 hours a week)
