Summary of Module			
<p>This module will equip participants to define and critically assess the values that underpin youth and community ministries in a Christian context or in a Christian perspective. It draws on theological principles consistent with CLD youth and community work while rooting these values in Christian tradition expressed through Scripture, theology, general church practice and particular expressions of Christian faith communities. The module will then support participants to construct and critically reflect on their own convictions before exploring the values which enable partnership working in communities and churches expressed either in Christian youth ministry, youth or community work, or in relevant secular work or volunteering roles. This module operates alongside the ‘Practices of Youth and Community Ministries’.</p>
