### **Summary of Module**

This module is designed for learners who have a low-advanced level of English who would like to build on this to reach a level of English at CEFR Level mid C1 (mid advanced) and who need to be able to express increasingly complex concepts in English with confidence.

In this module the students will continue to engage in guided practice with and use of all four English language skills, and which is further augmented by weekly in class skill-based tasks and by independent study.

While the English Language modules at Levels 7 and 8 were supported by the use of a coursebook, from this point on, the English Language modules instead make use of materials developed in house, and tailored specifically to support the students in extending the skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing in a variety of contexts which will offer a degree of unpredictability.

As students are increasingly taking content-based modules elsewhere in their BA EL programme, they will now be able to incorporate further research on, discussion of, and output related to, the content of these modules, in a progressively knowledgeable and critical manner, moving towards an improved ability to make critical judgements regarding the discovery and use of sources.

It is a core module for students studying for a BA in English Language but will also serve as an option for those who want to take a complementary language course. It will develop specialist language knowledge and communication skills as well as learner autonomy and initiative
