#### **Summary of Module**

This module is designed to provide students with the opportunity to engage in substantial self-directed research and analysis within a structured framework of independent study. The students build on all their work so far in the degree to undertake a dissertation on a topic of their choice which weaves together psychology and criminology.

The dissertation may involve empirical data collection or a literature-based review. Students attend lectures/workshops regularly throughout each semester, designed to support their project work at each stage of the process. During these classes, students reflect on their progress and carry out tasks relating to psychology and criminology research and the rigours of independent study. They also receive support from an allocated supervisor who provides feedback and guidance across both T1 and T2. The module allows students to demonstrate all of the skills they have acquired during their studies on the programme, and to display their grasp of the subject matter in their chosen area of research.
