#### **Summary of Module**

This module is based solely upon the student's Practice Learning Experience and directly relates to the requirements of the Nursing and Midwifery Council's (2023) Standards for Education and Training. The module is also aligned with the Participation in Care Framework found in the Scottish Practice Assessment Document.

Students will undertake one episode of Practice Learning Experience equating to a total of 280 hours, taking place over Trimester 2 and Trimester 3.

The Practice Learning Experience will be assessed summatively. Using the Participation in Care Framework, the student's practice will be assessed under direct supervision using a pass/fail grade.

Successful completion of the module is based upon the assessment of the Practice Assessor in consultation with the Practice Supervisor(s) at the end of the Practice Learning Experience, including confirmation that the student has reached the level required to progress into Part 3 of their programme. The nominated academic assessor works in partnership with the Practice Assessor to evaluate and recommend the student for progression for this part of the programme, in line with programme standards and local and national policies.

Students will work closely with their Practice Assessor/Practice Supervisor who will direct and provide guided participation in care to ensure the students deliver safe, effective, personcentred care in a professional manner.

Students are streamed for their Practice Learning Experiences across the entirety of the programme, therefore a variety of different clinical areas will be utilised.

Students will also demonstrate professionalism in their attitudes and values as well as a positive approach to their own learning.

Student resilience and development is supported using small group reflection, facilitated by an academic from the mental health field of practice.

Formative opportunities will be provided during this module in a variety of mechanisms which may include: documented discussions with Practice Supervisors, Practice Assessors, Academic Assessors or other registrants, verbal feedback from Practice Supervisors, Assessors, other nurses and members of the multi-disciplinary team, feedback from patients/service-users or their families/significant others, feedback from other students and feedback from meetings with Academic Assessor.

In line with current learning and teaching principles, a 20-credit module includes 200 learning hours, normally including a minimum of 36 contact hours and maximum of 48 contact hours.

There is a Professional Statutory Body (PSB) requirement from the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) which stipulates how much time student nurses are required to spend in clinical practice. This is reflected in the allocated hours for this module. Students will be supported and assessed in clinical practice by a range of suitably qualified staff. In addition, on campus time before placement will prepare students for their time in clinical practice. This will be followed by on campus reflection post-placement to allow students to explore their time in clinical practice and to share their learning with peers.

Hours missed from the Practice Learning Experience will have to be retrieved later in the programme.
