15. Admission Criteria

Candidates must be able to satisfy the general admission requirements of the University of the West of Scotland as specified in Chapter 2 of the University Regulatory Framework together with the following programme requirements:

Appropriate Undergraduate Qualifications:

An Honours degree in a social science discipline of 2:1 or above. The programme admissions officer has the discretion to interview applicants as they determine to be appropriate for the requirements of the programme and any regulatory considerations.

Other Required Qualifications/Experience

Applications may be considered from applicants who have extensive practice experience and an honours degree in a relevant discipline, not less than 2:2, who can demonstrate that they can study at the requisite level.

Further desirable skills pre-application (i.e. to satisfy additional PSRB requirements or other)

Applicants to the social work programme are required to successfully obtain registration as a social work student with the Scottish Social Services Council. Any applicant who has not successfully obtained registration with the Scottish Social Services Council may be declined enrolment. In exceptional circumstances, an applicant may be permitted to enrol if they have made an application for registration for which the outcome is pending. In no circumstances, will any student be able to proceed beyond trimester one of year one, without successfully obtaining registration with the Scottish Social Services Council (SSSC).

It is the responsibility of registrants to maintain their registered status with the SSSC throughout their period of study. Any student that allows their registration to lapse or has their registration suspended by the SSSC, will be immediately suspended from this programme and may be withdrawn from this programme if their registration is not promptly reinstated.

The SSSC requires that applicants have numeracy skills that are at least equivalent to a minimum SCQF level 5 Core Skills Numeracy at Grade C. Core Skills level 5 numeracy is a component of National 5 -Applications of Mathematics and National 5 -Mathematics.

English language proficiency is also a requirement, also at SCQF 5. This requirement is deemed to have been met for students who have a first degree that is taught and assessed in the English language. The SSSC requires that international students achieve an IELTS score of 7.0 in all sub-components.

16	<p>General Overview</p> <p>Social work is located within the School of Education & Social Science (ESS) at UWS: this programme is accredited by the Scottish Social Services Council. The programme benefits from strong links with placement providers across the West and South of Scotland.</p> <p><u>The Student's Learning Journey</u></p> <p>Professional registration with the Scottish Social Services Council requires students to achieve enough credits to be awarded the Postgraduate Diploma in Social Work. Upon successful completion of the Post Graduate Diploma element of this degree, graduates are eligible to apply for registration with the SSSC or other social work regulators throughout the United Kingdom. This MSc offers a challenging and stimulating range of learning opportunities that will equip graduates with the key attributes necessary to work effectively in an increasingly globalised and pluralistic working environment.</p> <p>This MSc is based on two years of study culminating in a dissertation that allows students to explore their chosen area of social work practice in considerable depth. Research methods are not specifically taught within this MSc programme; consequently, students are advised not to enrol for the dissertation module unless they have previously completed a research methods module as part of their first degree.</p>
17	<p>Graduate Attributes, Employability & Personal Development Planning</p> <p>The MSc Social Work programme is fully aligned with institutional priorities such as the development of graduate attributes and personal development planning. The mapping of programme and module learning outcomes graduate attributes. Personal development is embedded within the curriculum: students have regular opportunities to capture, reflect and evaluate their progression, thereby stimulating their development. It is recognised that personal development planning is an essential component of lifelong learning and continuing professional development. Continuing professional development is a requirement of a registered social worker; hence the preparation for this that students receive during this programme will be of significant help to them in their future employment.</p>

	This is not a work-based learning programme; however, the programme does contain two substantive practice placements.

	<p>In line with the <u>Student Attendance and Engagement Procedure</u>, Students are defined as academically engaged if they are regularly engaged with timetabled teaching sessions, course-related learning resources including those in the Library and on the VLE, and complete assessments and submit these on time.</p> <p>For this programme, academic engagement equates to the following:</p> <p>Engagement with taught modules and completion of all assessments. In addition, students are required to complete 200 days of practice learning under the supervision of a practice teacher.</p>

22b	Level 11 - PgDip Criteria for Progression and Award
	<p>Students who have achieved 140 credits will be awarded the Postgraduate Diploma in Social Work, at the exam board which typically sits in trimester 02; usually in June each year. This will constitute an exit award for those students who will not be completing the dissertation; however, it will not constitute an exit award for those students that have enrolled to complete the dissertation in trimester 03. It should be noted that eligibility to register as a Newly Qualified Social Worker is dependent upon a student successfully obtaining the Postgraduate Diploma in Social Work.</p> <p>Students are not eligible to enrol for the Masters dissertation in social work unless they have passed all other modules in the programme.</p> <p>Distinction will be awarded in line with University Regulations and no imported credit can be used.
