Admission Criteria

Candidates must be able to satisfy the general admission requirements of the University of the West of Scotland as specified in Chapter 2 of the University Regulatory Framework together with the following programme requirements:

SQA National Qualifications

Entry to this programme at SCQF Level 7 with the following SQA qualifications: Grades B, B, B, C at Higher including English. Mathematics at least at National 5.

or GCE

Grades B, C, C at A level plus 3 GCSEs including English and Mathematics.

or SQA National Qualifications/Edexcel Foundation

Entry to Level 8 of this programme is only possible with an HNC Legal Services (or equivalent HNC in Law). Entry to Level 9 is only possible with an HND Legal Services (or equivalent HND in Law). No other Higher National programmes will be considered for advanced entry to the programme. The Programme Leader will determine the suitability of any equivalent HNC or HND in Law for advanced entry to the programme.

General Overview

The BA (Hons) Law programme seeks to promote knowledge, understanding, and critical awareness of a range of major concepts, values, principles, and rules of the Scottish legal system while also introducing students to comparisons with other European and non-European legal systems. Students undertaking this programme learn about the Scottish legal system and court structure in general while also pursuing in-depth knowledge of a variety of specialist branches of law. The study of law is contextualised throughout the programme as students will learn about the relevant social, economic, and political contexts in which law operates. Whilst the programme provides students with in-depth knowledge of Scots law and a more general knowledge of laws from other jurisdictions, it also enables students to develop generic and specialist transferable skills relevant to a career within the legal profession or in any other sector. Students undertaking this programme of study will be expected to develop a variety of communication skills, research skills, and skills of analysis, synthesis, and critical judgment suitable for a variety of forms of employment.

The programme is delivered both full-time and part-time. Full-time study lasts, normally, four years for the Honours title and three years for the Ordinary title. Part-time study lasts for a maximum of six years. However, part-time students can study between 30 and 119 credits per academic session thus shortening the length of time taken to obtain the qualification. Full-time and part-time delivery will, on the whole, be during the day. However, certain modules will be delivered in a blended manner whereby face-to-face contact is limited to one day per month supported by online learning materials. The delivery of the programme is designed in such a way as to maximise student participation and engagement with their learning. Many modules are delivered by means of on-campus workshops and online supported learning. The delivery of modules is tailored to the learning experience sought. Students, in workshops, will be expected to prepare in advance, using online materials provided via the Virtual Learning Environment and then explore, through discussion and student led activities such as presentations, the wider context in which the law is situated.

At SCQF Level 7 students study five core modules which provide a strong foundation in key principles of Scots Law. Students will study subjects such as Introduction to Legal Study, Public Law, Criminal Law, Scots Private Law 1: Contract Law, and Scots Private Law 2: Delict alongside modules designed to support their learning at University, in particular support their development as Law students. These modules assist in the development core skills and competencies required to progress the student's legal study and include Legal Advocacy Skills 1 and Contemporary Legal Issues 1. They provide students with the opportunity to reflect on their own personal learning, and professional skills and, where appropriate, aid the identification of strategies to further develop the student's personal learning and professional needs.

SCQF Level 8 builds upon the foundation skills and knowledge developed at Level 7 and introduces students to further in-depth study of key legal subjects. The core modules at Level 8 comprise 20 credit modules in areas of law identified as essential to ensure that students have a broad understanding of all of the main legal subjects. Students will study Law of Scots Private Law 3: Property, Scots Private Law 4: Family, Scots Private Law 4: Succession and Trusts and Company Law. There will be a range of optional modules to study such as Agency and Partnership Law, Consumers and the Law, Welfare Rights and Legal Advocacy Skills 2 as well as some modules from the wider BCI school.

SCQF Level 9 then introduces the student to more critical approaches to law. The purpose of this year of study is to enable students to develop skills in critical analysis through studying two core modules namely International Human Rights Law and Legal Research Methods. SCQF 9 provides much of the international comparisons within the programme and, where appropriate, students will study Scots law in the context of other global jurisdictions. SCQF Level 9 also allows the student to partake in more independent learning through work-based learning and through the Contemporary Legal Issues 3 module. At SCQF Level 9, students may have the opportunity to study abroad for up to one year.

SCQF Level 10 is taught almost entirely in the form of seminars and it is at this level that students will be expected to apply all of the skills developed in previous years of study to critique the law. Students complete a traditional Honours dissertation on legal topic of their choice supervised by a member of staff. The Honours Dissertation (Law) module spans terms 1 and 2 and is worth 40 credits. Students then select an additional 80 credits of optional modules, 60 of which must be law modules.

At each SCQF level students are given the opportunity to pursue study in other disciplines via their optional modules, although students must take at least 100 credits in law modules at each level to ensure the award criteria for the BA (Hons) Law degree is met. Students may wish to consider modules from the School of

Business and Creative Industries portfolio or indeed from other areas of the University, in particular languages.

Graduate Attributes, Employability & Personal Development Planning

Learning outcomes throughout the programme have been designed to ensure that, in addition to the development of knowledge and understanding of law, students will have the opportunity to develop those skills and attributes valued by employers, such as Universal, Work-ready, and Successful. Students gain Universal skills in that they are globally relevant independent thinkers as developed in assessments throughout the programme and in particular in the Honours Dissertation. Students are Work-ready in that they acquire appropriate knowledge, with good communication skills whilst striving to fulfil personal goals which leads them to Success. All modules are assessed on a knowledge and understanding basis, whereby students have to communicate, to the best of their abilities the knowledge gained. Students enter the workplace ready to utilities and develop the skills learned from their degree.

The programme has embedded employability into the curriculum, ensuring that all students are exposed to the development of key skills and have the opportunity to reflect on their own personal development. The programme has mapped the development of key skills throughout the programme, recognising that many employability skills and capabilities are complex and take time to develop. Deliberate attempts have been made to ensure that skills development is continually reinforced, and that transferability of skills is able to be demonstrated and built upon throughout the programme. There are a number of employability events throughout the year focusing on writing applications/CVs, further study and seeking graduate jobs or internships.

Students will be expected to reflect on and develop, employability skills and personal development planning throughout the length of their study as facilitated by their Year Lead but also more formally in the following modules:

Introduction to Legal Study

Legal Advocacy Skills 1

Legal Advocacy Skills 2

International Human Rights Law

Honours Dissertation (Law)

Work Based Learning/Placement Details

There are opportunities for students to engage in credit bearing work based learning as part of this programme and from the wider School of Business and Creative Industries. Students can take optional modules at Level 9 which allow them to undertake a project or work within a workplace setting.

Engagement

In line with the Academic Engagement Procedure, Students are defined as academically engaged if they are regularly engaged with timetabled teaching sessions, course-related learning resources including those in the Library and on the relevant learning platform, and complete assessments and submit these on time.

Where a programme has Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Body requirements these will be listed here:

Students are required to attend all scheduled teaching sessions and engage with the Virtual Learning Environment, lack of which could result in the student being referred to the Student Success Team, and could prevent student progression, and ultimately successful degree completion.

Students have a maximum of 2 years to progress through a module/level, which over 4 levels, could cumulatively take a maximum of 8 years for full-time study.

Students obtaining 480 credits, with a minimum of 100 LAWW module credits from each SCQF Level (Levels 7, 8, 9 and 10) including all core modules, are eligible for the exit award of BA (Hons)Law.

Regulations of Assessment
