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Admissions Criteria

Articulated entry:

For entry into Year 2 (Level 8) of the GA pathway through RPL, applicants must have a HNC/HND or relevant degree in social care, social services or other relevant discipline, such

as social sciences. All HNCs require an A in the Graded Unit. All HNDs require a minimum of B/A in graded units. All HNCs and HNDs must include Maths at National 5 Grade C (SCQF Level 5) or equivalent. Applicants without the Maths requirement will be able to sit a numeracy test mapped against SCQF Level 5 to ensure that Scottish Requirements for Social Work Education (SSSC, 2024) are met.

For entry into Year 2 (Level 8) of the GA pathway through APEL, applicants will produce evidence to show how they have met learning outcomes for Year 1 (Level 7) through their prior learning and work experience. This will be done through a written submission mapped to learning outcomes and by a Structured Professional Discussion which involves a presentation by the applicant on the skills and knowledge they bring from work experience, their reasons for applying, and how they plan to balance competing demands of academic and professional commitments during the course of the programme. Capacity in literacy will be assessed through their written submission. As with the RPL process, applicants will be able to sit a numeracy test mapped against SCQF Level 5 to ensure that Scottish Requirements for Social Work Education (SSSC, 2024) are met.

Due to the nature of the programme structure and placement requirements of the social work education accrediting body, candidates are not eligible for articulation beyond level 8.

Other Required Qualifications/Experience

All GA students must have a contract of employment (minimum of 21 hours per week) and approval from their employer to apply for the programme.

All social work students must be registered with the SSSC as social work students and maintain this registration for the duration of study.

- Students will not be able to progress to the following year of study without active registration.

- If SSSC declines to register a student for whatever reason, or withdraws registration, this will result in suspension and withdrawal from the social work programme.

English language proficiency is a requirement, with candidates expected to achieve IELTS average standard of 7.0.

Students cannot transfer into this programme without satisfying the programme entry requirements. As above, all GA students must have a contract of employment and approval from their employer to apply for the programme. Transfers from other GA programmes will be at the discretion of the Programme Leader.

Students must disclose any previous convictions during the application process.

Students must disclose any current criminal charges or convictions during study to the programme leader immediately. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action.

Further desirable skills pre-application

Due to the competitive nature of the admissions process:

- candidates that evidence experience of social care relevant employment or voluntary experience, or those who are carer experienced, will be preferred.

- ability to demonstrate clear understanding of the social work role, compassionate attributes and professional values and preparation for academic study, will be favoured.

- candidates must have sufficient communication skills, including IT literacy, written communication skills and verbal communication.

General Overview

GA social work students complete a programme of study underpinned by the Standards in Social Work Education (SiSWE), leading to a professional social work qualification, ready for practice.

Year 1: Developing critical foundational knowledge (SCQF Level 7: 120 credits)

Year 1 of the GA programme introduces students to foundational knowledge, such as the history, organisation and role of social work services in contemporary society, as well as introductions to psychology, sociology and social policy for social work. The aim here is to give students an introduction to social work anchored by a solid foundation in social science before building on this with more specialist social work modules in Year 2.

Year 2: Enhancing specialist skills and knowledge for practice (SCQF Level 8: 120 credits)

Year 2 of the GA programme will focus on building critical knowledge and developing specialist professional skills in preparation for practice. Core dimensions of critical reflection, effective communication, and application of theory to practice are explored across social work specific modules. There is a focus here on developing professional identity and starting to engage with people who use services (for example, the module Responsivity in Practice is largely facilitated by service users and organisations, and students have opportunities to interact, build core skills and co-produce knowledge within a classroom environment).

Year 3: Strengthening applied knowledge to practice (SCQF Level 9: 120 credits)

Year 3 of the GA programme will focus on the student transition to practice. This transition is scaffolded in the first instance by active engagement in simulated practice scenarios across Term 1 as part of a single 60 credit module: Advanced Skills. In this module students have the opportunity to work collaboratively with each other and with experts from practice to apply their knowledge and skills to a range of real-world situations they will encounter during their formal practice learning opportunities. The module aims to prepare students for placement in Term 2 of Year 3. This will be an 80-day practice learning opportunity where students are required to evidence all Standards in Social Work Education and Ethical Principles (SSSC, 2019) and where they will consolidate their learning from Years' 1 and 2 by applying specialist knowledge and skills in a real practice environment.

Year 4: Developing critical practice (SCQF Level 10: 120 credits)

Year 4 of the GA programme will commence with the final placement for the apprentice. This will be a 100-day practice learning opportunity, and as with first placement students will again evidence all Standards in Social Work Education and Ethical Principles (SSSC, 2019) as well as demonstrating readiness for practice by their critical application of specialist (and now advanced) knowledge and skills in professional practice settings. Students also engage with a 'capstone' research-based assessment that links their knowledge with their practice experience through the production of an academic poster and assignment providing an in-depth desk-based study of their practice setting. Students at this stage also engage in activities designed to prepare them for employment as professional social workers, including an assessment connected to identifying ongoing professional development needs in the form

of an Individual Learning Plan. Embedded in Year 4 will be a transitions curriculum to support GA preparation for the Newly Qualified Social Worker (NQSW) Supported Year in practice. This will be done by dedicating sessions to introduce final year students to the Core Elements that all NQSW's will be required to evidence in their first twelve months as a registered social worker. All activity in Year 4 will be covered in a single 120 credit module covering the entire academic year. The aim here is to end the programme with a fully integrated learning experience for students where theory, knowledge, skills and practice come together to form a unified consolidation of four years' worth of study in preparation for the professional workplace.

Typical Delivery Method

The programme will be delivered in a hybrid mode with a combination of synchronous / live online learning opportunities including learning materials, resources and learning activities through a virtual learning environment. Students will be expected to draw from their current practice and use examples within all learning activities, including summative assessment.

Apprentices will study across all three terms each year. In Level 7 and Level 8 this will equate to two modules per term, studied in a block (i.e. one module studied in full, followed by the other). There will be three hours of live online learning each week, plus six full days on campus each term. In Level 9 and 10 there are substantial periods of placement. Timetabled teaching will fit around this and will make use of all three terms as in L7 and L8.

Practice authenticity is prominent throughout the programme and learning and teaching reflects the diverse nature of social work practice. Influenced by the work of Kolb (1993) and Vygotsky (1978), the social work team embrace an active approach to teaching and learning that scaffolds development around critical reflection, abstract conceptualisation, active participation, practical application of theory, simulation, and integration of real-world experience. We encourage active learning by the use of case studies, problem-based activities, skills simulation, flipped classrooms, group presentations, and enquiry-based learning.

Students are assessed in a variety of ways throughout the programme. Programme assessment is informed by evolving social work practice demands, compassionate assessment theory and holistic assessment requirements.

Any additional costs

All GA social work students are required to register with the Scottish Social Services Council (SSSC) as a social work student for the duration of study.

GA social work students are required to undertake a Protection of Vulnerable Groups (PVG) check, as part of their SSSC registration and require an updated PVG check prior to placement. The university covers the cost of the updated PVG check.

Students are required to undertake two periods of placement. This will likely incur travel costs to and from placement for those GA students placed outwith their normal place of work.

Graduate Attributes, Employability & Personal Development Planning

This programme is fully aligned with institutional priorities around the development of graduate attributes and institutional policy on personal and professional development planning. Principles of '*I am UWS*' are embedded throughout the GA social work programme. A social work GA graduate from UWS will be:

- Universal - globally relevant with comprehensively applicable abilities, skills and behaviours.
- Work ready - dynamic and prepared for employment in complex, ever-changing environments which require lifelong learning and resilience.
- Successful - as a UWS graduate with a solid foundation on which to continue succeeding and realising my potential, across various contexts.

Through studying and graduating from UWS, our GA students will develop attributes across three dimensions:

- Academic – knowledge, skills and abilities related to high-level academic study.
- Personal – qualities and characteristics of well-rounded, developed, responsible individuals.
- Professional – skills, aptitudes and attitudes required for professional working life in the 21st Century.

The underpinning attributes are developed through the key skills and competencies developed as part of the GA degree programme. The mapping of programme and module learning outcomes and employability-integrated assessment ensures the visibility of graduate attributes, employability and citizenship competencies.

It is recognised that personal development planning is an essential component of lifelong learning and continuing and professional development. To support this activity, all students are provided with access to personal development planning tools. Additionally, students work closely with the Personal Academic Tutors to explore and develop key graduate attributes. Students are required to reflect on ongoing continuous professional development needs in their final study year, to ease the transition from education to professional social work employment.

Social work academic staff maintain close links with a range of organisations to maximise the practice authenticity of teaching and learning.

Student support and individualised learning are prominent and distinctive features of this programme. Social work is a challenging profession requiring professionals to seek support and guidance as appropriate and to demonstrate self-care. Student support and personal development planning are integral parts of this social work programme.

Work Based Learning/Placement Details

Given the professionally-accredited nature of the programme, there is significant emphasis on applied learning. Students engage in assessed placements at Levels 9 and 10. Placement opportunities are sourced within social work and/or social care organisations predominantly in the West and South of Scotland.

Students must pass each placement by evidencing their professional practice is of a level that satisfies the Standards in Social Work Education and Ethical (SSSC, 2019).

In addition to formal placement learning and authentic classroom learning, apprentices will augment their learning through their own workplace activities.

Attendance and Engagement

In line with the [Student Attendance and Engagement Procedure](#), Students are academically engaged if they are regularly attending and participating in timetabled on-campus and online teaching sessions, asynchronous online learning activities, course-related learning resources, and complete assessments and submit these on time.

For the purposes of this programme, academic engagement equates to the following:

Each module on this programme is subject to attendance requirements set by the SSSC. This equates to an 80% minimum threshold for attendance at scheduled teaching. A failure to satisfy this will result in reattend decisions, which will delay student progression.

The final Honours classification will be awarded in line with the UWS Regulatory Framework.

Regulations of Assessment

Candidates will be bound by the general assessment regulations of the University as specified in the [University Regulatory Framework](#).

An overview of the assessment details is provided in the Student Handbook and the assessment criteria for each module is provided in the module descriptor which forms part of the module pack issued to students. For further details on assessment please refer to Chapter 3 of the Regulatory Framework.

To qualify for an award of the University, students must complete all the programme requirements and must meet the credit minima detailed in Chapter 1 of the Regulatory Framework.

Combined Studies

There may be instances where a student has been unsuccessful in meeting the award criteria for the named award and for other more generic named awards existing within the School. Provided that they have met the credit requirements in line with the SCQF credit minima (please see Regulation 1.21), they will be eligible for a Combined Studies award (please see Regulation 1.61).
