Other Required Qualifications/Experience

This programme has been created for an international student market. All applicants will already hold an unconditional offer to undertake postgraduate study at UWS London campus. This programme, however, is not a pre-requisite for postgraduate study but, rather, a standalone, voluntary and 'formative' course.

All applicants will be over 21 and have the following qualifications:

- An acceptable 3-year bachelor's degree or equivalent
- An acceptable Level 9 equivalent with 2 years relevant work experience (<u>as per UWS</u>
 APEL/RPL handbook)
- year or 2-year diploma (Dazhaun) from China with 2 years relevant work experience
- Mature candidates with relevant work experience can also be considered. If the
 candidate is found suitable, they then can be recommended for the Graduate Certificate:
 Advanced Academic Practice programme. Applicants may be required to submit a claim
 as part of the application process. Detailed information on the University's APEL
 arrangements and procedures is available in the University's RPL guidelines.

When English is not the first language, applicants must normally be able to satisfy competence in English with an overall IELTS comparable score of 6.0 or above (with a minimum of 5.5 in each component), in so doing meeting the requirements of regulatory framework section 2.12.

16 General Overview

Taking cognizance of the diversity of backgrounds of the student population at UWS, the **Graduate Certificate: Advanced Academic Practice** is designed to prepare students for success on UWS London campus postgraduate taught programmes. The Graduate Certificate is undertaken full-time over one 15-week academic term and prepares students for Masters study by developing their academic skills, their use of English for academic purposes, their research and analysis skills, and their appreciation of the academic context of their intended course of study. This is a standalone programme and all applicants will already hold an unconditional offer to undertake postgraduate study at UWS London campus. It is worth emphasizing that this programme is not a pre-requisite but, rather, a 'formative' course aimed at preparing students for postgraduate study at UWS London campus. Students will be informed of the standalone, non pre-requisite, formative nature of this Graduate Certificate at the point of application for their Masters course.

A key component of this Graduate Certificate is that it will provide a bridge onto a range of disciplines within the UWS London campus, allowing students to move into their preferred subject area. The programme is designed to ensure that students acquire a range of generic and transferable skills applicable to a broad range of master's programmes, while there is also an element of contextualisation towards the student's intended course of study.

Students will be supported across the term to develop agency and extend their capacities as independent and autonomous learners.

The award is an SCQF Level 10 Graduate Certificate, comprising 60 credits. The programme consists of the following three 20-credit modules:

English for Academic Purposes (SCQF Level 9)

This module enables students with post-intermediate English to develop their skills in using the language in academic contexts. Students undertake an individual small-scale project though which they design a project of their choice, search for and evaluate documentary sources, critically analyse and interpret source materials, and develop evidence-based and balanced conclusions on the basis of prior analysis. In the process, students work on specific language areas including grammar, lexis, and style, as well as effective written and spoken communication.

Cultural & Contemporary Issues (SCQF Level 10)

This module enables students to extend and deepen their appreciation of the key contemporary issues in the subject that they will be progressing onto at

postgraduate level. Collaborative learning is central to this module and students will work in groups to deepen their subject knowledge and complete assessment tasks.

Research Skills (SCQF Level 10)

This module will ensure students are equipped with the skills required to design and conduct research. Taught areas will include introduction to research methods, qualitative and quantitative research, research ethics, and commonly used research tools. A key element of this module is the communication of research findings through presentation skills.

	The award is not intended to act as a progression requirement for Master's study, so students will normally be able to commence their postgraduate taught programme even if they fail to achieve the Graduate Certificate.
	Should students fail to complete the Graduate Certificate, they may be able to import the credits they have achieved into another programme of study via the Recognition of Prior Learning policies of different institutions. It is also possible that Level 10 credits could be imported into other undergraduate programmes, depending on context.

23 Regulations of Assessment
